The Congressional Coalition on Adoption Institute's (CCAI) Angels in Adoption™ Program provides Members of Congress the opportunity to honor an individual, couple, or organization from their district that has made an extraordinary contrion behalf children in need of homes. These heroes hail from all 50 states, the District of Columbia. and Puerto Rico and represent the wide spectrum of individuals involved in the adoption and foster care process. Since the program's inception in 1999, over 1,700 Angels have received this honor. CCAI also honors a select number of National Angels in Adoption™. On September 12<sup>th</sup>, these unsung heroes traveled to Washington DC to participate in three days of events designed to train them in using their personal experience to affect change on behalf of children in need of homes and to celebrate their hard work and dedication to the issue. Most met their NJ Congressman as well. Please meet our angels:

### <u>Kristine Best</u> *Representative Scott Garrett*

Kristine Best, who works as a nurse in the neonatal unit at Hackensack University Medical Center, has served as a foster parent for the past 23 years. She has mothered and nursed

16 children back to health, and also adopted three of them as her own. All of the children that have stayed with Kris had have had some sort of medical issue or special need and she ensured that they were all given the best medical attention possible, as well as the love and nurturing that all children deserve. Ms. Best made the decision to become a foster parent in her late twenties and adopted her first child when she was in her thirties. Her selfless decision to care for and help children in foster care was born out of her love for children and her dedication to service.

### <u>Jeanne Burstein</u> Representative Rodney Frelinghuysen

An adoption professional for the past 25 years, Jeannie Burstein has worked closely with all members of the adoption triad at Children's Aid and Family Services and Spence-Chapin Services to Families and Children. Her great sensitivity in counseling women facing unplanned pregnancies has helped to give many the strength and courage to make the best plan for their babies. Her thoughtfulness in conducting home studies for prospective adoptive parents helps them understand the unique challenges of adoptive parenthood. She is also committed to counseling and helping adult adoptees who want to find their birthparents and has successfully reunited over a hundred adopted individuals with their families of origin. She is responsible for the immeasurable healing of her adopted clients whose sense of self was enhanced by the search, and she also changed the lives of many birthparents. Ms. Burstein cares deeply about her clients and is a valuable sounding board and support to all of them. She is a consummate professional in her focus on child-centered adoption practice, providing information and unbiased support so that each client can come to a decision through honest exploration and determination. As one birthmother says, "Jeanne was more than supportive, kind, and compassionate during a very difficult time in my life. She contacted me after I made my adoption plan, and I told her I had regrets that I never held my baby. She spoke with his parents and they brought him back to the agency so I could hold him." Here at NJ ARCH, we were asked by several supervisors from Division of Child Protection and Permanency (DCP&P), formerly known as DYFS, to

supply NJ ARCH information and "goodie bags" for their families who finalized their adoptions. We were thrilled to be a part of such a wonderful event and look forward to it each year.

According to the *Star Ledger*, 810 New Jersey children had their adoptions finalized in 2012, 197 children during National Adoption Day. Last year, 1,096 children were adopted in New Jersey.

### NATALIE'S LIBRARY CORNER

Hello Readers. Welcome to Natalie's Library Corner.

This month I did something a little bit different. Rather than write a book review I decided to experiment with reviewing an online "webinar" or prerecorded online presentation. The webinar was offered by "Adoption Learning Partners" or ALP. ALP is a "web-based educational adoption resource professionals, parents, adopted individuals, and the families that love them. " The topic I chose to view was Overwhelmed for the Holidays: An Adoptive Parent's Guide to Navigating the Holidays presented by Judy Stigger, LCSW, as the timeliness of the topic caught my attention. Here are points from this webinar:

The purpose of the webinar was to decrease the amount of stress the holidays can bring to a family. The often frantic pace of the holidays, including travel, family gatherings, holiday foods and music can challenge children beyond their capacities to cope. Children who have only recently joined their adoptive families or who have sensory sensitivities are especially vulnerable at this time of year. This can result to power struggles and children having many meltdowns.

Three important points are shared and explored in detail:

"Understand your child's

capacity to cope."

- "Teach your children selfregulation skills."
- "Find ways to remember the birth family during the holidays."

Goals of the holiday season should be to create positive memories, to impart family values and to build good coping skills. A modest meal with a small guest list is best. The idea of having an alcohol free, informal, multi-generational family brunch, including birth and adoptive family members, could be a consideration instead of a large party that might end late at night.

Managing stimulation is key. Help children to self-regulate. Identify the things that cause stress for your child, for others and for you. Observe yourself and your child. What is the toughest time of day for your child, for others and for you? What tends to set your child off? What does your child look like when he/she is upset? Shift your thinking from won't to can't. Your child won't be reasonable when he is tired. Change to your child can't be reasonable when he is tired.

Part of managing stimulation is being consistent and being predictable. Bedtime and mealtime should be kept as close to the normal routine as possible. Preferably, nap time should also be kept close to the normal time. This would make things easier for everyone.

Rehearse what is going to happen. Explain frequently what is going to happen next. Surprises are not a good idea when you are attempting to manage stimulation. Practice shopping. Plan your shopping trip. Go to one store and buy the one item which was decided in advance. Practice through play. An Advent Calendar is a good tool to use because it involves opening one window a day and eating only the piece of chocolate that is in that window. This teaches trust, power and control, self-control and reciprocity.

Incorporate a ritual of remembering your child's other family at the holidays. Depending upon your relationship and comfort zone, call, send a card, visit or invite these people to your home. Your child remembers his birth parents, even though he might not talk about them with you.

CELEBRATE what your child contributes to your family.

Take aways from this webinar

- Monitor your body's stress levels.
- Recognize that sensory sensitivity is neurological. Don't request what a child *can't* do.
- Shape environment and plausible activities to encourage your child's success.
- Remember your child's birth family.
- Celebrate what your child contributes to your family.

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### FOSTER YOUTH INTERNSHIP (FYI) PROGRAM

Know a young adult that was in foster care who may want to make a difference? Consider having them apply to the Congressional Coalition on Adoption Institute (CCAI) Foster Youth Internship (FYI) program.

Established in 2003, the program's goal is to raise awareness to federal policymakers about the needs and unique perspectives of those who spent time in foster care.

As part of the program, CCAI organizes retreats, advocacy trainings, and various networking opportunities with experts in the child welfare field. Throughout the summer, the FYI interns spend time researching about policy issues affecting foster children across the

country. They then create a policy report that is presented at a Congressional briefing and released to child welfare advocates across the country.

As a result of the program, federal policymakers are shown firsthand the experiences of youth in foster care, and as a result go on to use their new knowledge to inspire legislative change. Interns participating in this program benefit both personally and professionally, gaining experience and skills that will bolster their careers for years to come and build a foundation to advocate for improving the foster care system.
