NJ ARCH is Celebrating 20 Years Supporting NJ Families Touched by Adoption!

This year marks the **20th Anniversary** of the launch of the NJ Adoption Resource Clearing House! NJ ARCH has seen many changes through the years and accomplished much to support those touched by adoption, foster care and/or kinship care.

This Anniversary Edition will highlight some of our accomplishments, share stories, memories and images to help us celebrate this wonderful achievement.

Let us start with a bit of history on how it all began...

In early 2003, our agency, Children's Aid and Family Services was awarded the NJ Department of Children and Families grant to provide information, support and education for those touched by adoption and foster care.

To create and support this new and exciting program, we needed great talent, with program vision and understanding of the adoption world. Under the leadership of Kathleen Russo, LCSW, the then Pre-and Post-Adoption Counseling Services (PACS) Director and Barbara Rall, LCSW as the Assistant Director of NJ ARCH, the program was born. Once the leadership was established, the team hiring began and we were off and running. The team included a Data Analyst, Resource Development Coordinator, two warm line workers (one Bi-Lingual in Spanish) as well as a webmaster consultant to create the new website.

Starting with a clean slate we researched the various statewide resources that assisted those touched by adoption as well as mental health professionals that focused on adoption issues. To help us meet the needs of the NJ community, we also launched a Statewide Advisory Committee that included those most impacted in the world of adoption. Included in this advisory committee were adopted persons, adoptive parents, birth parents, mental health professionals, adoption agency staff and adoption support group leaders. We listened to what they felt

was most important include with the new NJ ARCH program. During this time, we also researched the most educational articles and purchased the best books on adoption include in our NJ ARCH free lending library. Through diligent research, believe we have the most comprehensive adoptionfocused library in the state.

After several months of creating content for the NJ ARCH website, setting up our warm line processes, creating our library, and more, our program officially launched during National Adoption Month in November 2003. Announcing this new program at the Trenton State House with State representatives, adoption agencies, DCF stakeholders as well as several NJ newspapers was very exciting!

WHO'S IDEA WAS IT? By Rose Zeltser, LCSW

In the late 1980's the then New Jersey Director of the Division of Youth and Family Services (DYFS), Tom Blatner, created the New Jersey Adoption Services, Advisory Committee, whose mission was to strengthen the supports and services to the adoption and kinship families who welcome older children and children with special needs into their homes. I was on that committee.

The Advisory Committee, co-chaired by Ceil Zalkind of Advocates for Children of NJ (ACNJ) and Dr. Grace Sisto, of the then Children's Aid and Adoption Society, was instrumental in implementing innovative and creative, supports and services for New Jersey families.

Our first focus was in providina evidence-based treatment models for our Post-Adoption Counseling Services (PACS) program around the state. We also worked with the Rutgers University School of Social Work in developing the "Certificate Program in Adoption" through their Continuing Education Program. This program allowed any clinician to take a series of adoptionrelated clinical courses to certify them as experts in the field of adoption. The committee also strived to reduce the barriers to timely permanency for children in foster care who were waiting too long. In addition, we collaborated with the American Bar Association and the Family Courts in order to reduce the amount of time children waited in the litigation process.

After hearing from so many families that shared their experiences of raising children who had experienced trauma in their early years, it became clear that these children and families would need support throughout their lives. So we brainstormed:

How can we bring education and support services to the NJ general adoption community?

We decided that the best approach would be to create a web-based "adoption clearing house," which anyone could access, listing therapeutic resources, as well as educational articles and the ability to chat with adoption specialists on any question in the arena of adoption.

The amazina success of the New Jersey Adoption Resource Clearing House (NJ ARCH) indicates that our vision was indeed realized. Today, average of 187,000 consumers visit our website annually and over 500 consumers contact our warm lines each year, seeking help in many different arenas. By 2008, we were able to increase our outreach capacity to kinship families by launching the Kinship Care Clearing House (KinKonnect). This additional statewide program enabled the ever-growing number of kinship families to access the same array of information and resource information like NJ ARCH offers.

Congratulations to NJ ARCH for a successful 20 years in helping NJ's adoptive, foster and kinship families!

NJ LEADER HONORED AT ADOPTION EXCELLENCE AWARDS

Each year, the Children's Bureau, an Office of the Administration for Children and Families based in Washington, DC honors notable contributors in the field of adoption. This year, one of NJ's leaders was awarded this honor.

Virginia "Ginny" Kenny, MSW, has been an advocate for the children and families of New Jersey for the past 32 years in her various roles working for the Department of Children and Families, Division of Child Protection and Permanency. During her career, she has been an investigator, supervisor, casework supervisor, program manager, and Assis-



tant Director of Adoption Operations. She has been instrumental in supporting the positive outcomes for children who have been reunified with their birth parents, as well as ensuring children achieve permanency when reunification is not possible. Ginny is also an adjunct professor at Monmouth University, where she teaches a variety of social work classes.

She served on the board of the National Association of State Adoption Programs (NASAP) and the National Adoption Association (NAA). She was a member of the leadership team that piloted an effort in NJ for the Quality Improvement Center for Adoption and Guardianship Support and Preservation, for which she supported implementation of important intervention (Tuning in to Teens, or TINT) to support adoptive families. Ginny has also served a mentor for the AdoptUSKids Minority Professional Leadership Development (MPLD) program.

In celebration of the **20th Anniversary** of NJ ARCH, we thought we would share the story of why this section is entitled "**Natalie's Library Corner.**"

If anyone contacted our NJ ARCH program from 2003 - 2016, you may have heard the soft, reassuring voice of our primary Warm Line representative, Natalie Hamilton. In addition to being our primary warm line worker and outreach representative at events and conferences, Natalie was also our NJ ARCH librarian. One of Natalie's roles was to research, choose and physically set up our Free Lending Library. She identified book descriptions, DC numbers an more. Natalie was also responsible for writing our newsletter book reviews for over 40 newsletters created during her tenure. Unfortunately, Natalie passed away after a relatively short illness in December 2016 while still a part of our team. In 2017 we dedicated and renamed the library space the "Natalie Hamilton Memorial Library." continue to honor memory and legacy not physical with the library space but also with this newsletter book review column. For this 20th Anniversary Edition, we decided to reprint Natalie's very first book review published November 2003.

Reprinted from November 2003 By Natalie Hamilton

NATALIE'S **R**EVIEW

In 1986, Lois Melina wrote the book, Raising Adopted Children. At that time, her two children were preschoolers. The first edition shows a relatively new adoptive parent looking for answers. When the 2nd edition was printed in 1998, Lois Melina was "to reassure new adoptive parents that the satisfaction of raising adopted children continues and the deep love we feel for our children grows."

Melina says that infertility and adoption turned her life upside down. Her two adopted children came into her life by chance and they are the core of her daily life. She considers this to be an awesome realization.

<u>Raising Adopted Children</u> is divided into three sections.

PART I: "Instant Family" addresses the transition to adoptive parenthood, adjustment of the family, and bonding and attachment.

PART II: "At Home With Adoption" covers talking about adoption, how adoption affects the family, the question of whether adoptees are at risk, the important family history and contact with biological relatives.


PART III: "Special Issues in Adoption" deals with ethnic and cultural identity, international adoption, serious behavior problems and special situations in adoption.

The book is beautifully organized and reader friendly. As an adult adoptee and the adoptive mother of an adopted son and daughter, now adults, I found this read to be informative as well as insightful. It made me feel as though the author, Lois Melina, was a dear friend and that we were sharing parenting styles over coffee.
